The Avon Park Red Devils won their seventh Ridge Conference baseball game last Tuesday night when they defeated Ft. Meade's Miners 8-1 at Head Field. It was the second meeting of the two this year, Avon Park won the first game 14-0. J. C. Walker hurled 1 hit ball and fanned 14 Miners. Ralph Hill was high for the Devils with two for 3 and Virgil Martin and Moe Walker each got 2 for Ft. Meade is the first team to score a run off J. Walker and it was scored on a bad throw in the ninth inning. Cannon got the lone hit for the Miners and he scored their only run.-

The newest acquisition to the Museum collection is the special chair shown here. It was used when the 37th president of the United States traveled by helicopter. By sitting in this chair, you can get an idea of the special provisions that are made when dignitaries travel. This Helicopter Chair, donated by Commander Lt. Col. Michael Ryan, Avon Park Air Force Range was used by the First Helicopter Squadron stationed at Andrews AFB, Maryland. The Squadron supports distinguished visitors and Airlift Missions throughout the National Capital Region, Washington, D.C.

This chair was used onboard a U1N Huly helicopter for missions which included carrying President L. Johnson to and from Camp David. Presidential airlifts are now carried out by Marine 1.



Living In A Small Town by Warren Me'Farland

(This letter was written to the Historical Society for the newsletter in 2003 but was never published.) Mr. McFarland is a long-time member and faithful supporter of the Society and the Depot Museum)

Although I left Avon Park after graduating from high school in 1941, I have always felt I was fortunate to have grown up in the atmosphere and culture of that small town.

Our family moved to Avon Park in 1927 when my father, W.W. McFarland, became the station agent for the Atlantic Coastline Railroad. There were eight of us in the family, including my parents, Walter and Rachel. The children, oldest to youngest, were Edna, Edith, Paul, Marie, Warren and Dale. We lived in various rental houses until 1936 when my parents built one of the first, if not the first FHA financed homes in Highlands County, on Lake Lotela, on what was then the new Sebring highway, State Road 8, now State Road 17.

Both parents became active in church, civic, school [activities], with the exception of Dale, who could not wait for graduation to enlist in the U.S. Navy during World War II, but he later obtained a diploma. I (Warren) also enlisted in the U.S. Navy, after graduation in 1941.



After World War II, only Paul remained in Avon Park, the rest of us were scattered by schooling, marriage and jobs. My father had moved on to become Freight Agent for the ACL in Sarasota, but upon his retirement, returned to Avon Park, where he lived until his death in1964. My mother continued to live there until her age and health forced her to move into a retirement home in Longwood in 1987, where she lived until her death in 1995.

I think that those of us who grew up in Avon Park in the 1930's are blessed. It was a time

of innocence, both for those of us who lived there and, to some degree, for the world at large. We didn't lock our cars nor the doors to our homes. It was possible to know almost everyone who lived in town. Not only to know them, but to know where they lived, what kind of car they drove, where they went to church, and what they did for a living. My older brother Paul once said to me that he could not think of a single reason why anyone would want to live anywhere but in Avon Park. Although I have not lived there since I graduated from high school (for a variety of reasons), I tend to agree with him.



No, we were not changing a light bulb. Ricky installed solar panels on the security cameras and readjusted a flood light to illuminate the full length of the dining

car ramp. Nancy and Beth assisted and insured that proper safety protocols were observed.
